Alternative Provision, Activities and Support Services Catalogue - 2022

Introduction

We are aware that at times Gloucestershire schools will need to place students in alternative provision to access short-term provision that better meets their needs. Gloucestershire County Council would remind schools that ideally provision used is Ofsted registered.

This prospectus outlines unregistered provision that is available within the county. It is the responsibility of each school to quality assure the provision at regular intervals. The Ofsted framework is clear that, as part of an inspection, it is likely to contact external provisions that your school may use.

Where a school places a student with an unregistered provider, there are additional responsibilities schools should be aware of if placements are deemed full-time.

'Full-time' is not defined in law but it is suggested a child should be placed in such a provision for no more than 15 hours with 18 hours as the maximum limit.

An unregistered setting is deemed to be an independent school if it is providing full time education to five or more children and/or to one or more students with an EHCP or who are Looked After.

School leaders are reminded that if a school places a child full-time in an unregistered independent school, this is an <u>illegal provision</u>.

Overview

This is a list of voluntary and community and private sector providers operating in Gloucestershire who may be able to offer programmes of alternative education, mentoring, support services and activities. This catalogue has been developed as a resource tool to help schools and the local authority source information about these organisations.

Schools will be responsible for making their own arrangements for any alternative packages for their pupils. This will include reassuring themselves of the quality and suitability of any service, the monitoring and tracking of progress of individual pupils, value for money and if the provision meets the pupil's needs. This directory will explain the quality assurance that has been undertaken by the local authority and gives direction on commissioning external alternative education provision directly with providers. It will be regularly updated as new providers join or existing providers vary their offer.

Statutory School Obligations

This catalogue does not remove or affect any of the statutory obligations and duties upon schools in relation to the provision of education. Any child or young person placed by a school in alternative education provision, either full or part-time, remains on the roll of that school and responsibility for delivering the full-time statutory education offer and all other duties in respect of that child remains with the school.

The commissioning school remains responsible for monitoring the quality of the alternative provision and tracking the progress of individual children and young people and confirming that the provision given is of good quality, value for money and meets the pupil's needs.

Concerns about any provider must be highlighted and acted upon, with the Local Authority being informed as appropriate.

To be included in the catalogue, checks have been undertaken as part of the alternative provision quality assurance process. A self assessment has been sent to the providers and returned to the local authority containing the information below:

Schools can contact the Specialist Commissioning Team to establish whether the provider has completed these quality assurance checks with the local authority and we are happy to share these with schools. We also hold copies of policies on file.

Following the local authority's quality assurance process, this checklist is designed to help schools when commissioning any external alternative provision themselves. An agreement must be used to help ensure each of the relevant items has been covered and are included as necessary with any service level agreement or contract between the school and the provider. Ideally there should be one or two individuals within a school as a point of contact for an alternative education provider and to monitor the performance in line with the service level agreement or contract.

This checklist is for guidance purposes only. It will remain the responsibility of the commissioner to reassure themselves of the quality and suitability of any alternative provision.

Service Description

A+bility recognise that some children find a formal learning environment difficult to cope with and need a different approach to fulfil their learning requirements.

In addition to providing one-to-one academic support in English, Mathematics & ICT (& other subjects such as Science, when requested by schools) they work with children and young people outside the classroom.

A+bility offer an individualized, creative curriculum; leading to accredited awards whilst working with schools, EHCP and SEND teams, and other education providers. Services are tailored to meet individual needs and circumstances. They are vastly experienced in providing consistent support to children and young people with complex needs.

They can react quickly to referrals. The aim is to give students the support they need in order to return them to mainstream schools as soon as is suitable for the individual students.

Their highly experienced support workers collect students from their home, getting to know the student, and build up a rapport to ensure they feel safe, nurtured and are able to work in a settled environment. The A+bility teacher sets online or hard copy work for the student, tailored to meet their individual learning styles. The support workers either work in the community with students, in locations such as the Butterfly Garden near Staverton, libraries local to the individual student or at the base in Stonehouse next to the canal. They use an online tool to assess the students individual learning styles, and provide individualised work and activities accordingly. The outdoors is used for learning, and where possible carry out exercise and activities during break periods.

They ask the referring bodies for as much background information on the student as

A bespoke service is offered for students. If a school provides Schemes of Work & Curriculums, they do their best to deliver these programmes.

Each referring agency decides upon the number of hours for each student. Most students work the same hours as schools – 0930 – 1430. This may vary, depending upon staff availability and the nature of the students.

(inclusive of all costs) A lunch can be provided for the student and parents/carers can contribute, or schools can provide the free school meals allowance. possible, such as Risk Assessments and EHCP's (Education Health & Care Plans) so that they can quickly build up a picture of the student and understand their challenges and needs. Working with the students, they will develop recorded education and personal targets.

A highly experienced team of Social Workers feed into the management of behaviour and challenges posed by the students.

A+bility has a voluntary registration with Ofsted. The A+bility teacher is a qualified teacher: B.ED(Hons), DIC, M.Sc.

Service Description

Academy21 is an online education service that helps schools and local authorities to meet the challenge of delivering quality, cost effective alternative provision for pupils with a broad range of needs throughout the academic year. Academy21 currently work in over 250 schools supporting them to deliver effective, academically focused online teaching and learning provision. We have been awarded over 30 local authority framework agreements for alternative provision. Each framework is reviewed annually, and quality

assured every year by each individual authority.

Pupils follow our academically focused curriculum, taught by highly qualified teachers, from any suitable location where there is a broadband connection and computer. The online classroom is easy to navigate and use. It provides the opportunity for learners to interact with their teacher, peers and lesson content through voice, whiteboard, polling tools and quizzes, and through written responses. Breakout rooms are used to enable individual and small group activities, practicals in our science classes and differentiated work when learners may be making rapid progress or falling behind.

Our services are commissioned with two working days notice on a short-term basis such as to provide interim or day 6 provision, medium term in support of less complex medical issues or where re-integration is feasible through to longer term provision for young people with complex medical and mental health needs. There is no minimum purchase, no block booking and we do not ask schools to purchase credits in advance. Pupils remain on school roll and our courses can be attended from home, school or learning centre to support reintegration work or provide an academically focused alternative to support young people who may be disrupting their classes or who may be refusing or unable to attend their existing school.

Schools and local authorities can select individual subjects for their student, allowing them to build up the timetable appropriately. They can then select from any of these commissioning option. PAYG - schools and local authorities can set students up with no commitment to the duration of enrolment other than 1 week. It is a rolling contract meaning that they can leave the end date open and our provision will roll on each week until they provide one weeks notice to end. We then invoice at the end of each month in arrears. The invoice will only reflect what that student has been booked onto for the period.

Termly – Schools and local authorities can choose our termly option by selecting preferred subjects at any point in the school year, with costs calculated on a pro-rata basis to the end of the academic term ahead. If a learner leaves the provision early, the service can be transferred to another pupil and tailored to meet their individual need including changing subjects, timetable and Key Stage.

Annual - Our annual commissioning option can be calculated on a pro-rata basis to the end of the academic year. The service can also be transferred throughout the year to other pupils, changing the subjects, Key Stage and timetable.

Service Description

Apricot is an online alternative education provider. They offer live, interactive lessons with qualified specialist teachers primarily for students with medical and mental health needs. While their first remit is academic learning, they pay attention to the whole child and actively seek to increase student confidence, resilience, and learning behaviours. They are in the initial stages of becoming a truly trauma-informed alternative education provision.

Apricot provides national curriculum in most subjects from KS2–KS5, as well as Entry Level and Functional Skills. They provide a dozen interactive subscriptions for students at no additional cost (*e.g.*, MyMaths, ScienceBits, Doddle, eChalk, etc.).

Apricot's online lessons are accessed through both an interactive learning platform and dedicated online classrooms – so there are no travel costs. Students access lessons in their own safe physical environment (home/school/unit) using a computer, headset, and broadband connection. All systems are securely encrypted and lessons are recorded for safeguarding and child protection. Students feel safe and have fun while they are learning.

Apricot's teachers are experienced in delivering highly participatory lessons and in addressing complex needs, challenging behaviours, and compensating for gaps in education. They are expert at building trusting and productive relationships with their students, allowing students to progress quickly and catch up with their classmates for ease of reintegration.

Student-led learning is a priority at Apricot and teachers are constantly differentiating, extending, and planning lessons based on individual students, even within small groups (max

Service Description

Go Virtual supports Key Stage 3, 4 and 5 students to re-engage in learning. Programme length varies from 12 weeks to a full academic year, depending on a student's individual circumstances and needs.



Pro-Active Adventure employs outdoor education to work with and enable a wide variety of client groups. The organisation was formed by Clive Richley who is an experienced activity Centre manager and Child Protection social worker, and Jon Hilton who is a consultant trainer and research psychologist. Other senior team members include an educational specialist and experienced childcare professionals. Early College Placement

These opportunities are usually for year 11 students. In exceptional circumstances a year 10 student maybe considered but the college would need to be convinced that they have the maturity and resilience to sustain the placement and that there is suitable progression in year 11. Students who are currently on a school roll will need to be referred to the College through their school.

All Early College Placement opportunities are infill into post 16-18 classes. Only 2 Early College Placement students per class are permitted.

There are three main paths of study that they can choose from:

Vocational courses at Level 1.

- Students follow a programme of study which includes their vocational qualification, English and maths functional skills and work placement (approximately 3 days)
- English and maths are compulsory and unless students achieve these subjects they are considered to have failed their programme of study.

Vocational courses at Level 2.

Students receive support in respect of CIAG, welfare and when available, in class support. The fees charged do not include additional support for students with learning needs. If a student has an EHCP or requires support with behavior, basic skills or a disability, additional charges will need to be agreed to cover such costs.

The learners remain on the school roll and schools will be emailed attendance reports fortnightly, two weeks in arrears. All absences (including long-term absences) are followed up by letter or a telephone call.

Increased Flexibility courses

The Increased Flexibility programme is designed for 14-16 year olds who are attending mainstream education but would benefit from an enhanced vocational learning programme as part of their KS 4 school curriculum. The learners attend for 2 hours a week. Increased Flexibility gives the learners the opportunity to gain knowledge and experience of a vocational area and also assist with post -16 progression.
